Choir To Sing At English Cathedrals – Summer 2005 Tour Planned

The choirs of St. Thomas's have been invited to sing at York Minster and Gloucester Cathedral in 2005 and the St. Thomas's community is invited to join us. We will be singing daily services at York from August 15 to 21, and at Gloucester from August 22 to 28, 2005. Most services will be Evensong, but we will be responsible for singing a mass on Sundays, as well as on Monday, August 15, the Feast of the Assumption of The Blessed Virgin Mary.

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Those who have not visited York or Gloucester before are in for an incredible treat, for these great English Cathedrals are aptly described as being prayers in stone and glass. York Minster is England's largest medieval cathedral, built between 1220 and 1472. Gloucester Cathedral dates from even earlier, from 1089 to 1530, and includes a blend of Romanesque, Early English and Gothic architectural styles.

The entire St. Thomas's community is invited to join the choir and participate in the tour. A Planning Committee has been established and will keep everyone informed as work progresses. Several fund-raising initiatives will be designed, with the proviso that they will not have a negative impact on regular church givings. The first of these is a series of continued on page two

Saint Thomas's Priests & Delegates Participate in Election of new Bishop of Toronto

An Impression of the Electoral Synod

With the Parish's other Synod delegates (Jeff Creighton, Suan Seh Foo, and Phyllis Garden, as well as our clergy), I had the privilege of representing St. Thomas's at the Diocesan Synod of June 12th to elect a new Bishop of Toronto.

Archbishop Finlay announced his retirement (to take effect on June 11th) only after our hotly-contested parish Vestry meeting in February at which we were elected Synod delegates. So we had to unexpectedly put aside any preoccupation with the same-sex blessing issue and consider who should be the leading successor of the Apostles in our community.

Initially I thought I was the only lay delegate to have a poor sense of who amongst our diocesan clergy might be the best bishop to lead our Catholic faith and Anglican tradition in Toronto. I invited feedback, only to discover people were either very secretive about their preferences, or equally puzzled. To some degree the process seemed like a high school student council election where impressions were partly formed more on the basis of vague rumours than first-

CBC competition lies in its potential to build contacts between choirs from different regions of the country. "It knits the entire choral community together in Canada," he said. The St. Thomas's choir comprises about 30 people drawn from various walks of life: from M.Mus candidates to computer specialists, Latin scholars, lexicographers, librarians, and movers. For many singers, reports John, St. Thomas's has been their first "serious Anglican experience." Our choir's repertoire of liturgical music is broad and challenging, drawing on continental European motets and Mass settings, in addition to music from the Anglican cathedral tradition.

The entire Parish family is tremendously proud of John and the Choir's latest achievement! hand knowledge of the candidates and solid information. In the absence of open and lengthy campaigning by the candidates (which might pose other problems), there may be no alternative. I assume the clergy have a more intimate and solid understanding of the candidates. At least I hope so. That said, I consulted fairly widely and received some good feedback from various parish members.

The Diocese mailed us a package of information in late May with biographies of the then-nominated candidates (only two at that point). Unfortunately the Diocese was apparently a little brusque with at least one of our alternate Synod delegates when contacted for information. This failure to keep alternates involved might explain why only 391 of a possible 503 lay delegates registered at the Synod, an absentee rate of 22%. (The absentee rate for eligible clergy members was even higher at 28%.)

In any event, two more candidates were nominated by Synod day and their biographies were available at registration. It was very regrettable to hear that Bishop Victoria Matthews of Edmonton had to withdraw her name because of her being diagnosed with breast cancer.

Phyllis Garden says "business" Synods meet somewhere near the Airport strip, but electoral ones meet at the Cathedral. So on Synod day, a Saturday morning, each of us made our own way to St. James' Cathedral's annex and handed in

our "tickets" at a very efficient registration booth. Then we made our way through a confusing series of tunnels to the Cathedral itself, at first hearing rumours we were to be sequestered like a Roman sacred consisitory. The smokers, of course, were the first to breach this discipline, while those parked at street meters broke the remaining constraints. But we were asked to refrain from commenting to outsiders about the progress of the balloting until it was over.

The Synod commenced with a BAS mass, celebrated I believe by the Acting Metropolitan of Ontario (the Bishop of Moosonee). Delegates then separated ourselves into two groups: the clergy in the pews on the north side of the nave, and the lay delegates on the south side. The four St. T's delegates found each other and sat together with Glen Spurrell, representing St. Stephen's. We also cornered Fr Andrews and found time to chat with Frs Ross, Freeland and Little.

The voting commenced without any nominations or speeches. Each delegate simply wrote the last name of a candidate on the slip of unmarked coloured paper we had been given at registration. (The clergy had a different colour than the laity.) Then we stepped forward en masse and deposited our pieces of paper

These types of tours not only enhance the calibre and reputation of the choir, they also strengthen the sense of parish community and provide profound experiences of music, spirituality, and historical and architectural grandeur. in inelegant ballot boxes (foil-wrapped cardboard). As each delegate voted, a nearby official handed out another piece of differently coloured paper for the next ballot. You were out of luck for the rest of the Synod if you didn't get your next ballot then, because officials don't waste time on further lists or verification! You vote, you get another ballot then, or you do without!

As a result, the balloting took surprisingly little time, with the first ballot completed around 11:20 am. While the counting took place "off-stage", many of the delegates participated in a hymnsing.

These results were announced at 12 noon, delegates summoned to return by a traveling hand bell. Bishop Colin Johnson of Trent-Durham received 99 clergy and 151 lay votes, Bishop Ann Tottenham of Credit Valley received 87 clergy and 110 lay votes, Dean Douglas Stoute of the Cathedral received 56 clergy and 61 lay votes, and Bishop George Elliott of York-Simcoe received 52 clergy and 61 lay votes. 13 ballots were spoiled and 14 members present didn't vote.

A candidate must secure a majority of each "house" of Synod to win (clergy and laity). I was suitably motivated when it was announced a mechanism to break a deadlock between the houses would be implemented only after the 12th ballot!

The second ballot started almost immediately, again without speeches, apparent lobbying, or indeed anything but quiet chatter. It was finished by about 12:30 pm, and the results were announced just before 1 p.m. Bishop Johnson remained in the lead in both houses with 128 clergy and 183 lay votes. Bishop Tottenham stayed in second place with 111 clergy and 136 lay votes. The Dean fell to 35 clergy and 32 lay votes, while Bishop Elliott secured only 18 clerical and 32 lay votes. 5 ballots were spoiled and 11 delegates didn't vote.

Two minutes later the announcement was made that both the Dean and Bishop Eliott had withdrawn from the race, making it a contest between Bishops and Tottenham.

The third ballot took less than 20 to conduct. 30 minutes after, the sement was made: Bishop John-eccived 5 more clerical votes to be elected (147 to 135), and a more majority of 34 from the lay 149 for Bishop Totten-


Garden Focus of June Benedictine Day

ham). I calculated 30 delegates spoiled their ballots or didn't vote.

There was of course a great deal of applause at that point, barely 3 hours after the voting started, and Bishop Tottenham's motion to make the vote unanimous was carried without objection.

While well-wishers lined up to speak to Bishop Johnson and all of the other candidates, many simply left the church to enjoy the day, and things began to quiet down. Bishop Johnson spoke briefly but well.

Several days later the Diocesan web site announced that Bishop Johnson's installation will take place in September, and he has fixed November 12th as the date to elect a suffragan bishop to replace him. The same-sex issue, originally scheduled to be decided on the latter date, has been moved to November 27th. I have a feeling at least one of our alternate delegates may see some action in November!

In the meantime all six lay delegates and alternates are, I believe, considering the issues for the fall very seriously, and I hope we will meet to discuss and share our views before the special Synod meets. That doesn't mean we will agree – after all we have our "constituencies" in the parish to represent!

The foregoing constitute some of my observations, although I am sure they capture only a fraction of what was there to see and sense. I encourage anyone interested to speak to the other delegates about their impressions and views.







Although our income is down, the expenses have also been minimized so far this year. This is partly because the Parish Committees' income and expenses are lower than the very optimistic budgets set in January. So overall, our deficit is very close to what we thought it would be at this time.

June givings were down a bit more than hoped and so compared to last year at this time, we are about \$1500 lower in terms of income. Our hopes were that we would exceed last year's givings but there is still 6 months left to see a further increase in overall donations.

Trash Talk at St T's!!??

In October of this year, Toronto goes green! As some of you will already be aware, the City of Toronto will be joining the green bin collection program already installed in Etobicoke and other places.

As Saint Thomas's has municipal garbage pick up, we are obliged to participate fully in this effort by the city to get a handle on the overall garbage prob-

lem. I believe that we must organize ourselves in such a way that this will be an easy transition when the time comes.

Fact: Did you know that it takes a minimum of approximately two hours solid work to get our garbage to the curb? There is no reason that this time frame should increase if we all cooperate a little bit more.

Fact: A very high percentage of our garbage would be considered green bin material - ie, coffee grounds, paper towels, food scraps, diapers and similar materials. If interested, I can provide a copy of the city's list of green bin items.

Fact: Did you know that recycling is mandatory? To quote from the City's latest calendar, "Toronto's waste disposal by-law states that recycling is mandatory at all residential locations receiving municipal garbage collection, including apartment buildings." The Parish is lucky to still be able to have municipal garbage pick up. If the city ever refuses to take our trash then we would have to pay for private pick up.

The Huron Play School will be implementing the new rules when they start their next school year in September. As well, some of them have been worked into the design of the new kitchen. I will be asking for suggestions from everyone how they think we can make the green bin plan work for the church. For more information please check out www.toronto.ca/greenbin

PROVIDING FOR OUR FUTURE

WORSHIP DUCATION MUSIC OUTREACH

The 130th Anniversary celebrations would be enjoyable in and of themselves under any circumstances. But their significance is diminished if they do not lead to a lively understanding of the needs of the Parish, and a faithful re-commitment by all members of the Saint Thomas's family towards four areas of its corporate life. The special nature of Saint Thomas's today is possible only because many others – notably our greatest benefactor, Gerald Larkin – made provision for the financial well-being of the Parish. Prudence suggests and faithfulness requires that we in our turn act in a provident way to build on the foundation they laid with love and commitment.

Our Anniversary reflections have led the Parish to establish a FOUNDATION STONES programme which provides both a vehicle for some current needs of the Parish, and also one element of a more permanent structure to encourage members and friends to support the ongoing work of Saint Thomas's. It offers opportunities for givers to honour 130 years of faithful witness, a new avenue whereby all may join in the work of benefaction which has made viable the Parish we know and love.

As in so much of Anglican practice, the old saying remains apt: ALL MAY, SOME SHOULD, NONE MUST. The Parish presents its needs, and a programme whereby congregants and friends may feel called to support that witness. Neither clergy nor wardens will call on anyone to solicit their help; they will of course be delighted, on request, to explain any aspect of the plan and to explore means of creative giving and specific needs with anyone who may be interested.

FOUNDATION STONES

BLESSED WITH THE GIFTS OF YESTERYEAR,
TODAY'S SAINT THOMAS'S PROVIDES FOR THE FUTURE

THE 130th ANNIVERSARY FUND represents the beginning of a process, not its end. It marks the start of an opportunity for donors to assist in securing the future of the Parish in ways reflecting the central emphases of its very being.

Gifts to this Fund received during the Anniversary Year – September 1, 2004 – September 1, 2005 – reflect the thank-offering of Saint Thomas's people during the 130th Anniversary celebrations. Funds will be, in the first instance, devoted to the renewal of the White High Mass set of Vestments, and then to other urgent needs of the Parish as outlined below. Over the years, any surplus in the Fund will grow, and so add to the financial foundation which supports the well-being and traditions of the Parish as do the existing Larkin and Heritage Funds.

WORSHIP

"Worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness"

Worship through the 130th Anniversary Fund provides for the renewal of Saint Thomas's beautiful vestments, whose exquisite workmanship reveals the determination of their creators to offer the best of their talents to God. Whether through the renewal of the white High Mass set, the provision of a purple High Mass set, or the refurbishment of many historic items now consigned to a vault and rarely seen, the Parish emphasizes its own commitment to offer the praises of the Almighty with solemn dignity. Wherever possible it

will seek new Canadian sources for traditional artistry in order to encourage the development of the creative talents of our own era. As always, it maintains the expectation of donors by valuing our heritage through commissioning only the highest standards of design and workmanship. The Anniversary Fund will thus help to sustain the worship of the Parish through the living tradition of its vestments.

EDUCATION

"And He sat down, and taught them."

reflects the traditions of the Parish as a centre of informed teaching about the traditions of Catholic Christendom, and the application of the Sacramental life of the Church to the lives of Christian men and women in the world. Reflecting St Thomas's long-standing relationship with Trinity College, a cardinal element of the Parish's teaching ministry is the Larkin-Stuart Lecture Series, presented annually as gift and inspiration to the wider community. Through the Anniversary Fund, the Parish will be better equipped to maintain the trust of those who established the Series, and broaden its outreach, by engaging the most distinguished speakers and promoting the Lectures as broadly as possible.

MUSIC

"Sing ye praises with understanding."

Music through the 130th Anniversary Fund maintains the choral and organ programme as integral to the liturgy of the Parish, and to its growth as a gather-

ed community, justly known for the highest standards of music and musicianship offered to the praise of the Almighty. The eventual endowment of an organ scholar and choir section leads will assure the continuity of St Thomas's musical tradition. The concomitant removal of these and associated items from the Parish's operating budget will in time free funds for other aspects of its work. The Anniversary Fund will help to assure that the beauty of holiness found within Saint Thomas's walls will continue to be known to all whose footsteps lead them to Huron Street.

OUTREACH

"Love thy neighbour as thyself."

Outreach through the 130th Anniversary Fund enables the spread of the Gospel imperative to those who come to Saint Thomas's seeking material assistance. It builds on the traditions of yesteryear: Humewood House for unwed mothers, Camp Artaban for children, St Thomas's House for seniors. It affirms the current outreach projects such as the "Out of the Cold" experience, the offering of dinners on Thanksgiving and the provision of Friday evening sandwich suppers in summer and hot meals throughout the winter. This burgeoning emphasis of the Parish's life envisions future programmes made possible through a Parish Nurse, a Parish Visitor and a portion of a Curate's responsibilities. So Saint Thomas's will continue to welcome to its doors not only those seeking sustenance, but also that unqualified accepting love so central to the Anglo-Catholic urban tradition. The Anniversary Fund encourages parishioners and friends to realize that at this Church the social Gospel will continue not simply to be preached, but to be acted upon.
