## THE WORD OF THE LORD : TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS At the Solemn Eucharist at 11 o'clock THE FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT

The new liturgical year opens with promises and prayers, promises of the coming reign of God and prayers that the people of God will be ready for that reign. The biblical texts set a tone of hopeful expectation, yet not without trepidation in view of the awesome events to come. The Old Testament reading is an announcement that the ancient promise of a Davidic messiah will be fulfilled and Jerusalem will dwell secure. The responsorial psalm is a prayer for help and forgiveness, reaffirming the righteousness and faithfulness of God already expressed in the reading from Jeremiah 33. In the epistle, Paul's prayer that he be allowed to join the faithful in Thessalonica becomes a petition that they be ready for the coming of the Lord. The Gospel lection sets the season of Advent into an eschatological framework: the signs in the heavens indicate that the kingdom of God is near.

## FIRST READING: Jeremiah 33.14-16

Behold, the days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah. In those days and at that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David; and he shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In those days Judah will be saved and Jerusalem will live in safety. And this is the name by which it will be called: "The Lord is our righteousness."

PSALM: 25.1-10—Ad te, Domine, levavi; Tone I,4



- 1 UN-TO thee, O Lord, do I lift up my soul : my God, I have put my trust in thee.
- 2 O let me not be con-found-ed : neither let mine enemies tri-umph ο-ver me.
- 3 For all they that hope in thee shall not be a-sham-ed: but such as transgress without a cause shall be put to con-fu-sion.

## SECOND READING: 1 Thessalonians 3.9-13

How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy that we feel before our God because of you? Night and day we pray most earnestly that we may see you face to face and restore whatever is lacking in your faith. Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus direct our way to you. And may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we abound in love for you. And may he so strengthen your hearts in holiness that you may be blameless before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his saints.

Jesus said, "And there will be signs in sun and moon and stars, and upon earth distress of nations in perplexity at the roaring of the sea and the waves, men fainting with fear and with foreboding of what is coming on the world; for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, look up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." And he told them a parable: "Look at the fig tree, and all the trees; as soon as they come out in leaf, you see for yourselves and know that the summer is already near.
