THE WORD OF THE LORD : TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS At the Solemn Eucharist at 11 o'clock THE THIRD SUNDAY IN ADVENT

As the church anticipates celebrating the Incarnation, the readings for the day highlight eschatological themes — things concerned with the end of time, the last days. The effect is to recall that the birth of a particular baby is part of the culmination of God's will for the world. The texts have in common the healing of the sick as signs of the new order. Isaiah celebrates the transformation of the wilderness into a fertile land; the healing of the blind, the deaf, the lame, and the dumb; and the restoration of Zion. In the Gospel lection, John the Baptist is confirmed as the one who prepared the way for Jesus, and Jesus is confirmed as the Messiah through his healing of the sick and preaching of good news to the poor. The Magnificat praises God for acts of salvation, and the Epistle of James affirms that the coming of the Lord is at hand and counsels patience.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 35.1-10

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God. Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. Say to those who are of a fearful heart, "Be strong, do not fear! Here is your God. He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense. He will come and save you." Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. For waters shall break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; the haunt of jackals shall become a swamp, the grass shall become reeds and rushes. A highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Holy Way; the unclean shall not travel on it, but it shall be for God's people; no traveller, not even fools shall go astray. No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there. And the ransomed of the Lord shall return, and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain joy and gladness, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

SECOND READING: James 5.7-10

Be patient, beloved, until the coming of the Lord. The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. You also must be patient. Strengthen your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is near. Beloved, do not grumble against one another, so that you may not be judged. See, the Judge is standing at the doors! As an example of suffering and patience, beloved, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.
