THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING: Exodus 12.1-14

The First Lesson is written in the twelfth chapter of the book of Exodus, beginning at the first verse.

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbour in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses

in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the Passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgements: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt. This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

HOLY GOSPEL: John 13.1-17, 31b-35

The Lord be with you. **And with thy spirit.**

The Holy Gospel is written in the thirteenth chapter of the Gospel according to Saint John, beginning at the first verse.

Glory be to thee O Lord.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean." After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord - and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them. Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot

come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

THE MAUNDY

Those who are to take part in the washing of the feet are led to seats prepared for them and the congregation sits down. The Celebrant removes the chasuble, is girded with a towel and approaching each person in turn, bows to them and kneels to wash each one's feet and wipe them with a towel.

Meanwhile the choir sings the antiphon.

Ubi Caritas et amor, Deus ibi est. Congregavit nos in unum Christi amor. Exsultemus et in ipso jucundemur. Timeamus et amemus Deum vivum. Et ex corde diligamus nos sincero. Ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est. Amen.

Where charity and love are, there is God. The love of Christ has gathered us together. Let us rejoice in Him and be glad. Let us fear and love the living God. And let us love one another with a sincere heart. Amen.

At the conclusion of the ceremony the Celebrant puts on the chasuble again and with the Deacon and Subdeacon goes to stand before the High Altar. Whereupon all stand and this prayer is offered from the Royal Maundy rite.

Lord Jesus Christ, who when about to institute the holy Sacrament at thy Last Supper, didst wash the feet of thy Apostles, teaching us, by thy example, the grace of humility: Cleanse us, we beseech thee, from all stain of sin, that we may be worthy partakers of thy holy mysteries; who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Ghost, one God, world without end. **Amen.**

Our Lord Jesus Christ saith: A new commandment I give unto you, that ye love one another; even as I have loved you, that ye also love each other.

The Deacon reads the Intentions and bids the People's additions, silently or aloud.

Ye that do truly and earnestly repent you of your sins, and are in love and charity with your neighbours, and intend to lead the new life, following the commandments of God, and walking from henceforth in his holy ways: Draw near with faith, and take this holy Sacrament to your comfort; and make your humble confession to Almighty God, meekly kneeling upon your knees.

Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, Maker of all things, Judge of all men: We acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness, Which we from time to time most grievously have committed, By thought, word, and deed, Against thy Divine Majesty. We do earnestly repent, And are heartily sorry for these our misdoings. Have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; For thy Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, Forgive us all that is past; And grant that we may ever hereafter Serve and please thee In newness of life, To the honour and glory of thy Name; Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Wherefore, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, we thy humble servants, with all thy holy Church, remembering the precious death of thy beloved Son, his mighty resurrection, and glorious ascension, and looking for his coming again in glory, do make before thee, in this sacrament of the holy Bread of eternal life and the Cup of everlasting salvation, the memorial which he hath commanded; And we entirely desire thy fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, most humbly beseeching thee to grant, that by the merits and death of thy Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his blood, we and all thy whole Church may obtain remission of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion; And we pray that by the power of thy Holy Spirit, all we who are partakers of this holy Communion may be fulfilled with thy grace and heavenly benediction; through Jesus Christ our Lord, by whom and with whom, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honour and glory be unto thee, O Father Almighty, world without end. **Amen.**

THE LORD'S PRAYER, FRACTION AND PEACE

Celebrant: As our Saviour Christ hath commanded and taught us we are bold to say:

Our Father who art in heaven, Hallowed be thy Name, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive them that trespass against us; And lead us not into temptation, But deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, For ever and ever. Amen.

The consecrated Bread is broken. A sustained period of silence is kept, after which the Celebrant bids the Peace.

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

And with thy spirit.

The Celebrant then kneels to begin the Prayer of Humble Access.

HOLY COMMUNION

All who intend to receive Holy Communion pray together:

We do not presume

to come to this thy Table, O merciful Lord, Trusting in our own righteousness, But in thy manifold and great mercies. We are not worthy So much as to gather up the crumbs under thy Table. But thou art the same Lord, Whose property is always to have mercy: Grant us therefore, gracious Lord, So to eat the Flesh of thy dear Son Jesus Christ, And to drink his Blood, That our sinful bodies may be made clean by his Body, And our souls washed through his most precious Blood, And that we may evermore dwell in him, And he in us. Amen.

On this most holy night in which our Lord instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood, it is fitting that the common cup be restored to the People. Accordingly, the Celebrant with the bread will take up the usual position at the chancel step, while those bearing chalices will be stationed to the Celebrant's left and right. If you do not wish to receive from the cup, simply reverence Christ's Real Presence by crossing yourself or bowing as you pass by. As a reminder, the Diocese of Toronto does not permit intinction (dipping the host into the cup).

PROCESSION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

All remain kneeling while the Blessed Sacrament is carried through the church in procession to the Altar of Repose. During the procession the hymn Pange, lingua is sung, and when the place of reposition is reached, Tantum ergo.

STRIPPING AND WASHING OF THE ALTAR

The People are seated as the ministers strip the altar, during which the choir sings Psalm 22.

Antiphon:

They part / my garments a-mong them : and cast lots up-on my ves-ture.



- 1 My God, my God, why hast thou for-sa-ken_me: and art so far from my help, and from the words of my_com_plaint?
- O my God, I cry in the day-time, but thou hearest not : and in the night-season al-so I take_no_rest.
- 3 And thou continuest ho-ly: O thou wor-ship of Is_ra_el.
- 4 Our fathers trusted in thee: they trusted in thee, and thou didst de-liv-er_them.
- 5 They called upon thee, and were sa-ved: they put their trust in thee, and were not con-found_ed.
- 6 But as for me, I am a worm and no man: a very scorn of men, and the outcast of the peo_ple.
- 7 All they that see me laugh me to scorn: they shoot out their lips, and shake_their_heads,
- 8 Saying, 'He trusted in God, that he would de-liv-er_him: let him deliver him, if he de-light-eth in_him.'
- 9 But thou art he that took me from the womb: thou wast my hope, when I hangéd yet up-on my mo_ther's_breasts.
- 10 I have been left unto thee ever since I was born: thou art my God even from my mo_ther's_womb.
- 11 O go not from me, for trouble is hard at hand : and there is none to help_me.
- 12 Many oxen are come a-bout me : strong bulls of Bashan close me in on ev_ery_side.
- 13 They gape upon me with their mouths: as it were a ramping and a roar-ing li-on.
- 14 I am pouréd out like water, and all my bones are out of joint : my heart also in the midst of my body is e-ven like melt_ing_wax.
- 15 My strength is driéd up like a potsherd, and my tongue cleaveth to my gums : and thou bringest me in-to the dust_of_death.
- 16 For many dogs are come a-bout me: and the council of the wicked layeth siege a-gainst_me.
- 17 They piercéd my hands and my feet; I may count all my bones : they stand staring and look-ing up-on_me.
- 18 They part my garments a-mong them : and cast lots up-on my ves<u>-</u>ture.
- 19 But be not thou far from me, O Lord: thou art my succour, haste thee to help_me.
- Deliver my soul from the sword : and my life from the power of the dog.
- 21 Save me from the lion's mouth: thou hast heard me also from among the horns of the wild ox-en.
- 22 I will declare thy Name unto my breth-ren: in the midst of the congregation will I praise_thee.
- O praise the Lord, ye that fear him: magnify him, all ye of the seed of Jacob, and stand in awe of him, all ye seed of Is-ra-el.
- For he hath not despiséd nor abhorréd the low estate of the poor : he hath not hid his face from him; but when he called unto him he heard_him.
