Then Herod, when he had privily called the wise men, inquired of them diligently what time the star appeared. When they saw the star, they rejoiced

NINTH LESSON: John 1.1-14 (*Read by the Rector*)

Reader: Saint John unfolds the great mystery of the Incarnation.

And the light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. That was the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made by him, and the world knew him not.
