FIRST READING: Joel 2.1-2,12-17a

The First Lesson is written in the second chapter of the book of the prophet Joel, beginning at the first verse.

Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the Lord is coming, it is near - a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come. Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the Lord, your God? Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy. Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the Lord, weep. Let them say, "Spare your people, O Lord, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations."

PSALM: 103.8-18 Tone VIII,2

- 8 The Lord is full of compassion and **gra**-cious : long-suffering, and **of** great good-ness.
- 9 He will not alway be **chi**-ding : neither keepeth he his an-**ger** for ev-er.
- 10 He hath not dealt with us after our **sins** : nor rewarded us according to our **wick**-ed-ness-es.
- 11 For look how high the heaven is in comparison of the **earth** : so great is his mercy also toward **them** that fear him.

SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5.20b—6.10

The Epistle is written in the fifth chapter of St Paul's second epistle to the Corinthians, beginning at the twentieth verse.

We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labours, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honour and dishonour, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see - we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

SERMON

THE BLESSING & IMPOSITION OF THE ASHES

The Celebrant then addresses the people, saying:

THE LENTEN EXHORTATION

Brothers and sisters in Christ, every year at the time of the Christian Passover, we celebrate our redemption through the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Lent is a time to prepare for this celebration and to renew our life in the paschal mystery. I invite you therefore, in the name of the Lord, to observe a holy Lent by self-examination, penitence, prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, and by reading and meditating on the word of God.

LITANY OF PENITENCE

All: Most holy and merciful Father, we confess to thee, to one another, and to the whole communion of saints in heaven and on earth, that we have sinned by our own fault in thought, word, and deed; by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved thee with our whole heart, and mind, and strength. We have not loved our neighbours as ourselves. We have not forgiven others, as we have been forgiven. **Have mercy on us, Lord.**

We have been deaf to thy call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved thy Holy Spirit.

Have mercy on us, Lord.

We confess to thee, Lord, all our past unfaithfulness: the pride, hypocrisy, and impatience of our lives.

We confess to thee, Lord.

Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people. We confess to thee, Lord.

Our anger at our own frustration and our envy of those more

fortunate than ourselves.

We confess to thee, Lord.

Our intemperate love of worldly goods and comforts, and our dishonesty in daily life and work.

We confess to thee, Lord.

Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to commend the faith that is in us.

We confess to thee, Lord.

Accept our repentance, Lord, for the wrongs we have done: for our blindness to human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty.

Accept our repentance, Lord.

For all false judgements, for uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbours and for our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us.

Accept our repentance, Lord.

For our waste and pollution of thy creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us.

Accept our repentance, Lord.

Restore us, good Lord, and let thine anger depart from us; Hear us, Lord, for thy mercy is great.

The priest blesses the ashes, saying:

Almighty God, who hast created us out of the dust of the earth: Bl(+)ess and sanc(+)tify these ashes, that they may be to us a sign of our mortality and our penitence, that we may remember that it is only by thy gracious gift that we are given eternal life; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The priest imposes ashes on the head of each person present, saying:

Remember that dust thou art, and unto dust shalt thou return.

Remain kneeling, throughout the imposition of ashes.

The choir sings:

Wash me throughly from my wickedness, and forgive me all my sin. For I acknowledge my faults, and my sin is ever before me. (Psalm 51.2–3)
