

THE EXHORTATION

Dearly Beloved, we have come together to lift up our hearts unto the Lord in remembrance of all who have died because of war, giving thanks for all the members of this parish whose faithfulness and generosity, even in grief, moved them to erect a war memorial and baptistery that declares their confidence in Christ's victory over sin and death.

We come as well to give thanks for all who, in defence of justice and freedom, have been ready to lay down their lives for our country; for all members of the Navy, the Army, the Air Force, and for all Peacekeeping soldiers; remembering the members of our parish who died in the Great War and the Second World War.

And we come also to express our grief that peace has not reigned throughout the world; that soldiers and civilians continue to suffer from the horrors of war unto this very day. Recognizing that people of every race and creed continue to grieve the death of loved ones, we are gathered to acknowledge that we, too, have often failed to work for peace, but have rather inflicted harm on our neighbours, and thereby failed to be a community where mutual affection reigns.

We gather to offer prayers for the leaders of the world, that God would guide them by his spirit of counsel and of strength, and that by their endeavours, peace and justice, freedom and order, may be established among all nations, and especially among those nations and peoples that are at enmity and strife at this very hour.

We gather our thoughts and prayers together in the words which Our Lord has taught us, as we say:

Our Father,
Who art in heaven,
Hallowed be thy Name;
Thy kingdom come;
Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread;
And forgive us our trespasses,
As we forgive them that trespass against us.
And lead us not into temptation,
But deliver us from evil.
For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory,
For ever and ever. Amen.

FIRST LESSON

Ecclesiasticus 11.7-28

The First Lesson is written in the book of Ecclesiasticus, in the eleventh chapter, beginning at the seventh verse.

Do not find fault before you investigate; examine first, and then criticize. Do not answer before you listen, and do not interrupt when another is speaking. Do not argue about a matter that does not concern you, and do not sit with sinners when they judge a case. My child, do not busy yourself with many matters; if you multiply activities, you will not be held blameless. If you pursue, you will not overtake, and by fleeing you will not escape.

There are those who work and struggle and hurry, but are so much the more in want. There are others who are slow and need help, who lack strength and abound in poverty; but the eyes of the Lord look kindly upon them; he lifts them out of their lowly condition and raises up their heads to the amazement of many.

Good things and bad, life and death, poverty and wealth, come from the Lord. The Lord's gift remains with the devout, and his favour brings lasting success. One becomes rich through diligence and self-denial, and the reward allotted to him is this: when he says, 'I have found rest, and now I shall feast on my goods!' he does not know how long it will be until he leaves them to others and dies. Stand by your agreement and attend to it, and grow old in your work. Do not wonder at the works of a sinner, but trust in the Lord and keep at your job; for it is easy in the sight of the Lord to make the poor rich suddenly, in an instant. The blessing of the Lord is the reward of the pious, and quickly God causes his blessing to flourish.

Do not say, 'What do I need, and what further benefit can be mine?' Do not say, 'I have enough, and what harm can come to me now?' In the day of prosperity, adversity is forgotten, and in the day of adversity, prosperity is not remembered. For it is easy for the Lord on the day of death to reward individuals according to their conduct. An hour's misery makes one forget past delights, and at the close of one's life one's deeds are revealed. Call no one happy before his death; by how he ends, a person becomes known.

SECOND LESSON Matthew 18.1-20

The Second Lesson is written in the Gospel according to Saint Matthew, in the eighteenth chapter, beginning at the first verse.

At that time the disciples came to Jesus and asked, 'Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?' He called a child, whom he put among them, and said, 'Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever becomes humble like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven. Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me. If any of you put a stumbling-block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were fastened around your neck and you were drowned in the depth of the sea. Woe to the world because of stumbling-blocks! Occasions for stumbling are bound to come, but woe to the one by whom the stumbling-block comes! If your hand or your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off and throw it away; it is better for you to enter life maimed or lame than to have two hands or two feet and to be thrown into the eternal fire. And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out and throw it away; it is better for you to enter life with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into the hell of fire.

Take care that you do not despise one of these little ones; for, I tell you, in heaven their angels continually see the face of my Father in heaven. What do you think? If a shepherd has a hundred sheep, and one of them has gone astray, does he not leave the ninety-nine on the mountains and go in search of the one that went astray? And if he finds it, truly I tell you, he rejoices over it more than over the ninety-nine that never went astray.

So it is not the will of your Father in heaven that one of these little ones should be lost. If another member of the church sins against you, go and point out the fault when the two of you are alone. If the member listens to you, you have regained that one. But if you are not listened to, take one or two others along with you, so that every word may be confirmed by the evidence of two or three witnesses. If the member refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church; and if the offender refuses to listen even to the church, let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax-collector. Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven. Again, truly I tell you, if two of you agree on earth about anything you ask, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them.'

Lord, have mercy upon us. Christ, have mercy upon us. Lord, have mercy upon us.



THE GREAT WAR MEMORIAL BAPTISTERY

How well they fell asleep! Like some proud river, widening toward the sea; Calmly, grandly, silently and deep, Life joined to eternity.

Baptistery Inscription, after Samuel Taylor Coleridge

Of the 60,000 Canadians killed in the First World War, 35 were parishioners of St. Thomas's. They belonged to every branch of the armed forces, and included one nursing sister.

The octagonal baptistery was designed by parishioner Eden Smith, who had, nearly 30 years earlier, erected the church, and it has not changed fundamentally since its dedication in 1922. The benches surrounding the octagonal space, focusing on the baptismal font, and the lamp hanging over it with the Madonna and Child at its apex, enabled family and friends of parishioners commemorated in the baptistery to sit and grieve, and to contemplate the mysteries of life and death within the context of Christ's death and resurrection.

The space continues to be used by parishioners and visitors in the same way. The dark oak panelling dominates the room, but the light filtering from above makes the gold lettering of the names stand out, and the names appear to hover over the font. The baptistery asserts architecturally the theological conviction that despite the darkness and chaos of this present world, of humanity's making, there is, nonetheless, an order and a light found above. That Light was born into the world to draw us up, through baptism, into the divine Light and Life.

The crucifix on the wall behind the font was created by another parishioner, A. Scott Carter, whose work in wood and silver can be seen elsewhere in the church.

The magnificent Saragossa Lamp over the font, is the work of Henry Wilson, a British architect who worked with John Sedding on some of the most significant Arts and Crafts churches in England. Wilson gradually moved toward the creation of church furnishings and jewellery. Among his patrons were Peter and Gerald Larkin, who may have purchased the lamp as early as 1908.

Other Great War memorials are found in several places in the church. Perhaps the most poignant memorial is a set of black Requiem vestments created by the women of the parish during the War, and which has only recently been retired.
